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

ACHIEVEMENTS





U nder the All India Pravaas Program, on 20th May 2017 BJP national president Shri Amit Shah undertook a one day tour of Chandigarh. Media Relations & Contact Department

M edia is a very important part of democracy and is known as the fourth pillar of democracy. As a political party, the BJP has adopted internal democracy in a very transparent manner. The party's Media Relations Department is working as the medium of communication between the media and the party. The BJP's Media Relations Department works at different levels including National and State. The duties of this department is to properly establish a viable information system and channel and to exchange and disseminate information. The party's media contact department mainly carries out the following activities.

- The Bharatiya Janata Party's media department organizes dialogue and contact programmes at regular intervals with the editors of a number of media houses, including all the newspapers in the country.
- The BJP's media department's prime focus is to ensure clarity and remove misrepresentations, confusion regarding the party's stands and positions and regarding the policies pursued by the Narendra Modi led BJP government at the centre and other BJP led governments in the states. The media department is responsible for contacting the media, position party leaders who can speak or engage in conversation on a particular subject and generate a dialogue and debate in the media.
- The media department ensures that those who take part in news channel debates regularly or write in different newspapers and magazines, have the right information about the party and the government. Contact and dialogue with such people is arranged by the party's media department.

receive accurate information about political parties. In such a situation, the BJP's media relations department works on the policy of providing proper information to them and continues communicating with them regularly.

- It is also the responsibility of the media relations department to keep an eye on and closely monitor the contents in the media about the party and the government. Many a times it happens that there is some wrong information regarding the party in the media, in such cases, the department promptly acts to rectify the wrong information. This department also works to organize regular press conferences etc. on various subjects, if necessary.
- The party's media relations department also works to bring together people connected to the media and to present before them issues and points in the right perspective.
- One of the main responsibilities of the media department is to draft and issue press releases and ensure that these received wide coverage.

At the time of the Congress led UPA government the country's economy was in a state of turmoil, today India is the fastest growing economy in the world.


Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi has brought a very big electoral reform program to bring about cleanliness in our political life and to curb the ill effects of black money from public life.

National Party President Amit Shah's speech to intellectuals in Gujarat



The BJP is celebrating 2017 as Pandit Deendayal Upadhayaya's birth centenary year in which two kinds of commemorations have been organized. The first comprises commissioning articles on Deendayal ji, familiarizing the lay public with his views and popularizing his theories. BJP ruled governments and municipalities will be accordingly run in keeping with the principles enunciated by him. The Government of India will formulate plans in the name of Deendayal ji, his statue will be installed at various places, and roads and gardens named after him.

The second kind will be executed by the BJP through its "Organization Expansion Campaign" in which the focus will be on widening the party's acceptance by spreading the thoughts and ideals of Deendayal ji. This massive outreach will be conducted by four million party activists across the country of which I am one. The exercise will involve doorto-door visits to people's homes, brief them on the BJP's plans, get them to become members, plaster their place with stickers, and distribute party literature. These four lakh activists will work full time, be it for a year, six months, or 15 days. They will fan out across the length and breadth of the country -- from Kamrup to Kutch and from Kashmir to Kanya Kumari. They will spend their nights at local booths.

Friends, this is a mammoth exercise. When the postindependence history of the country will be written, the Deendayal Upadhyaya Birth Centenary Expansion Scheme will find special mention. The intellectual class whose thoughts and views influence society, will also have to be introduced to the BJP -- but not as the party in power at the Centre and states. What will have to be explained is why the BJP is in politics and what is its ultimate goal? Also where does the BJP stand vis-à-vis other parties on these two counts? This is what I have come to talk about and explain with humility.

Friends, the BJP is ruling the country today. As a party worker I firmly believe that the BJP is different from all other parties. That it is the best outfit is something I have never doubted. To claim this would only be normal for a party worker who is currently also its president. But if I have to actually establish the claim, a comparative study with other



parties would be necessary. In my opinion this comparison can be made at three levels. First, whether there is any internal democracy within the party second, the principles on which the party is run, and third, how are governments run by it working in reality.

Internal democracy

India adopted the multiparty parliamentary system after independence. Which meant that politics would be conducted by parties, not individuals. If the country is run on the writ of a single person, then it is his/her word alone that matters. But under a multiparty system, members of parliament are elected in the name of the party. Members of the single largest party choose a leader who runs the country on their behalf. So when we talk of parliamentary democracy, the state of internal democracy within parties is a crucial factor. A party in which internal democracy is weak cannot strengthen the country's democracy. Friends, there are currently 1,650 political parties in the country. And I can say without the slightest doubt or hesitation that the BJP and the communist parties are the only ones in which internal democracy is intact.

So what does this mean? Let me give you an example of the Congress party. Who will be the Congress president after Sonia Gandhi? Does anyone sitting in this hall have any doubts on this score? Everyone knows it will be Rahul Gandhi.

Now let me ask who will become the BJP president after me? Nobody can tell! This is because the BJP does not choose its national president on the basis of caste or dynasty, but on the basis of diligence, loyalty and hard work. If this was not true, a booth head of a booth in Sanghvi School at Naranpura could never have become the party's national president. And the son of a poor tea seller whose family had nothing to do with politics and whose caste did not matter in the political arithmetic of Gujarat could not have become the country's prime minister. This proves that there is internal democracy in the BJP. The future here is not captive to individual whim, but is like a free flowing river which determines its own direction. There must be something different about the BJP that a 16-year-old boy who put up posters and distributed pamphlets became its national president. Again, it is only in the BJP that someone can become chief minister or prime minister solely on the strength of competence.

Friends, compare this to the situation prevailing in other parties and you will see that internal democracy is missing. Lack of internal democracy is the biggest threat to a diverse country like India. Of the 1,650 parties, the BJP is the only one in which elections are held from booth to national president every three years. The BJP is like a flash of lightening in the surrounding darkness which envelops parties lacking in internal democracy. Open views are welcome only in the BJP.

Party theory and ideal

Friends, at the core of the BJP is its ideology and principles. The party was not founded to capture power or have its own prime minister. To understand this, let us go dig into history. The Jana Sangh (forerunner of the BJP) was founded in the 1950s. The country had freshly got its Independence, complete credit for which was garnered by the Congress. The popularity of Jawaharlal Nehru was at its peak. The Congress seemed indispensable. None could imagine another party taking its place.

Now the Jana Sangh did not come into existence because it was foreseen that someone from its new avatar, the BJP, would become prime minister in 2014 or that Atal Bihari Vajpayee would someday head a coalition government. The Jana Sangh was formed because the policies pursued by the Nehru regime were not right. It was widely felt that policy drafts on education, agriculture, finance, foreign affairs, defense etc. lacked an indigenous element, and were largely aimed at pleasing the West. There was an impression that the country was steering the wrong course, and that its problems would not be solved.

Friends, whenever a choice has to made between two divergent paths, and we are required to go rightward, but due to an erroneous decision we lurch left, and go as far as 50 km along the route, we end up 100 kms from our destination because we took the wrong turn. Which is why some leaders felt that the policies being pursued would not work. Unfortunately, there was nobody to give us a hearing. Jawaharlal ji had a huge majority, and he was right on top of the popularity charts. This was the situation in which some people thought of floating another party and place a counter narrative before the public. This is why the Jana Sangh was formed in 1951, but it was then not even in a position to win a municipal poll. It was not before 1967 that it got some electoral success in the national polls, but was nowhere close to getting a majority on its own.

In those days there was not much difference between Congress and Jana Sangh leaders. Corruption within the Congress showed up well after 1965. Commitment to patriotic values was roughly the same. So what was the difference? When a person asks a worker like me to explain this in a sentence, I say at that time the Congress believed that

everything in this country was old, be it culture, traditions, institutions. They wanted to destroy everything and make a new country.

The Jana Sangh, on the other hand, believed that old is previous. Political circumstances had reduced us to slaves for centuries. The need of the hour was thus to renovate. Possibly some rebuilding too, but not a complete overhaul. This was the real divergence between the Jana Sangh and Congress. This was when the politics of post-independent India began to be seen in binaries.

Once the Bharatiya Jana Sangh came into its own, Pandit Deendayal ji began enunciating the principle of cultural nationalism. Nationalism and patriotism are flip sides of the same coin. By conjoining the country's culture with it, he introduced the concept of cultural nationalism to the country's political vocabulary and discourse. Economic development requires free trade and free farming which cannot happen without removing all encumbrances. But this strictly needs to be done in the interests of Antodya ie. to bring the first and last person in the same line of development. Antodya and cultural nationalism were thus the twin bedrocks on which the Jana Sangh was formed.

Political parties are judged by their work. There is no better measure of a party's character than the nature of campaigns run by it in the national interest. The BJP's passage from the Bharatiya Jana Sangh to the Bharatiya Janata Party speaks for itself. None of our objectives was aimed at coming to power or get our leader to be prime minister. Our very first movement was against cow-slaughter, the second to stop Kutch from going to Pakistan. The purpose of all, be it the Kutch satyagraha, Hyderabad satyagraha, Goa satyagraha, the Ram Janmbhoomi or anti-corruption movements was to find a solution to the country's problems, not the deification of any personality.

Friends, the character of parties is also judged by the quality of its leaders. Shri Syama Prasad Mookerjee sacrificed his life for Kashmir. Deendayal ji was murdered. Others such as Kushabhau Thakre ji, Sunder Singh Bhandari ji, Atal ji, Advani ji, Rajmata Scindia ji, Kailashapati Mishra ji, and Bhai Mahavir ji made various sacrifices for the party and country. I know many well-known leaders who spent every ounce of their energy for the Jan Sangh and the BJP, and in the service of Bharat Mata.

A party which launched such movements with selfsacrificing leaders at the helm can only have the national interest in mind. This is the fundamental principle on which it works. Friends, this is how a party which began its journey with 10 members of the Jan Sangh has more than 11 crore members today. Time was when the party did not have a single MLA: today it has 1,387 and is in power in 13



states. At the Centre is the absolute majority government of Narendra Modi. Modi ji has been working tirelessly to raise the country's standing in the eyes of the world.

The BJP runs on principles, cultural nationalism and antyoday being its lodestar. In the audience there may be many who know the situation prevailing in other parties. Does the Congress have any principles? None that I know. And this I don't necessarily say as a political opponent. On the contrary it is based on a comparative study. Just as I have told you of the raison d'être behind the formation of the Jana Sangh and the BJP, the Congress too should be subjected to the same analysis.

The Congress was founded by an Englishman who ran an NGO, but later became a platform for the country's Independence struggle. People of all political persuasions joined to help secure the country's freedom. Among them were Leftists, Rightists, Communists, and Socialists. Even maulanas and swamis. So the Congress was never a party with an ideological pivot. It was conceived as a special purpose vehicle to earn the country's independence.

Ask a Congressmen to talk of his ideology and he will look left and right and come up with something inane. I have asked this question many times. You too should ask. Let me know the answer you get. A party lacking in principles is devoid of direction. If someone asks me how did BJP come to have 11 crore workers, I will tell him it is because we are working to make Bharat Mata a guiding light for the world. If you put the same query to Congressmen, they will tell you their limited agenda is to park Rahul Gandhi in the prime minister's chair. So friends, if a party cannot protect internal democracy, how can it be good for the country? A party not formed on the basis of principles can never run on principles. How then can it work in the country's interest?

Working method of governments

Again, what also needs to be considered is when the party came to power, what is the character of its government? This too is a matter of research. In the 70 years since Independence, four types of governments have run this country: Congress state and central governments; second, communist regimes in Kerala, West Bengal and Tripura which were in power for many years; third, regional outfits like the SP, BSP, JDU, RJD and BJD. And lastly the BJP and its governments in the Centre and states. I humbly request all you intellectuals sitting here to compare how these four types of governments have fared in the court of the people. The facts and figures are available on the Internet. The comparative study should be based on development markers like GDP, agricultural growth rate, education, health, welfare for the poor, infrastructure etc. I have sifted the data. So I can say with confidence that BJP governments have performed the best. Quite apart from boosting development, they have provided the most stable governments.

Now you may feel Amit Bhai often says such things. In the 1950s, global economists hailing from India coined the term "bimaru rajya" to describe badly run states from the perspective of financial indiscipline, administrative mismanagement etc. Now which were these "bimaru" states. The acronym was coined from the first letter of four states: B for Bihar, Ma for Madhya Pradesh, R for Rajasthan, and U for Uttar Pradesh. What is the state of these "bimaru" states today? Till the BJP was part of the Nitish Kumar led coalition, Bihar had wriggled out of its sick status. Now, slowly but surely, it is getting sick again. Madhya Pradesh has been a BJP ruled state for 17 years, and has shed its bimaru skin. It has been contributing to the nation's development with an agricultural growth rate of 10 per cent. Chhattisgarh too, after its separation from MP, no longer figures in the bimaru category. Rajasthan has been ruled by BJP governments for quite long, and the bimaru tag has been consigned to the dustbin. Let me assure you that after five years when you seek the accounts of Uttar Pradesh, it would have lost its bimaru identity. So if there is any party which has provided good governance, financial discipline, and social welfare, it is the BJP regimes. It is they who began the trend of providing holistic and inclusive governance. The Gujarat model was a gift of Narendra Modi ji.

What is development? Someone who has one car today should have three tomorrow. This is not our idea of development. Real development happens when every citizen of the country is involved in the development model. Every educated, illiterate, uneducated, man or woman, dalits, urban dwellers, villagers, entrepreneurs, farmers are conscious that development is happening. The BJP has been working on such a development model.

Friends, the sort of government at the Centre which Narendra bhai has been running is an example of an allinclusive and all-encompassing government. I do not what to say much beyond giving two examples. After becoming prime minister, Narendra Bhai announced the Jandhan Yojana in his first speech. Everyone felt that the Jandhan Yojana meant opening a bank account. Even after 70 years of independence, 60 per cent people and their families had no bank account. Narendra bhai decided to open 28.7 crore bank accounts within two years. Today there is not a single family which does not have the convenience of a bank account.



Having a bank account means the direct involvement of the poor with the country's economy, the right to save, and financial security.

Friends, after the Jandhan Yojana, Narendra bhai decided that subsidies would be put directly into the account of beneficiaries: LPG subsidy for one. Previously you got cheap gas, now the subsidy money is put into your account. You may want to know what is the benefit because this involves more hassle. Getting it cheap was easier earlier. It was good. But I would like to inform you that corruption worth Rs 14 crore was inbuilt into the subsidy system, the benefits of which went to ghost users of gas cylinders. All five star hotels in Baroda cooked delicious lunches on fake gas connections. Now they have to pay for the cylinders sans subsidy. Corruption of Rs 14,000 crore was thus abolished in one stroke with direct subsidy transfer.

Narendra bhai then made another appeal. This time I too felt that he was conducting daring experiments. He told you that being god-blessed you were in a position to sacrifice your LPG subsidy for the welfare of the poor. Was't he expecting too much? We are living in times when even if a seat on a bus or train in front of you is empty, and a new passenger comes and instead of taking the empty seat in front plonks himself in the seat next to you, making you wonder why did he not take the seat in front. Old curtsies like offering your seat to the old and infirm are vanishing. In a society where people don't show respect to the elderly, Narendra Bhai expected people to sacrifice their subsidy. Surprise of surprises 10.5 million heeded the request. This is the effect of good leadership. Lal Bahadur Shastri once said in 1965 that America takes full advantage of our rice shortage. It keeps putting pressure on us. To avoid compromising our war effort (with Pakistan), people should stop eating rice. People listened and gave up eating rice. After 1965, it was Modi ji who had the courage to make a similar request in 2017, and one crore people gave up their subsidy.

Then Modi ji decided to give gas cylinders to five crore poor rural women of the country. People sitting here probably do not understand the importance of gas cylinders and the Ujjwala scheme because you have forgotten the days of shortages. But friends, imagine a mother burning cow dung cakes and wood in her hut, and the whole place is filled with smoke. Even if she does not smoke bidis or cigarettes, the smoke of 400 cigarettes goes into his lungs and she gets TB. Her child will be born weak, and her aged in-laws would probably die due to exposure to smoke. Such a prospect never worried us for 70 years. Today after getting a gas stove she has joined the mainstream, and has a stake in the nation's prosperity. The government of Narendra Modi ji has made this possible. First, money was saved by depositing subsidy directly into their bank accounts. Then an appeal was made to the better off to sacrifice subsidy, and finally five crore families were brought under the Ujjwala plan. This gave them confidence. Friends, this is what the BJP government is all about.

You may also feel that what's the big deal in making 400 million toilets in three years? Friends, you probably do not know how people live in eastern Uttar Pradesh and Bihar. I had the opportunity to observe it from close quarters. When a 17-year-old girl has to perform her morning ablutions in the open, scores of eyes observe the act. Imagine her mental state and the humiliation she is put through. Now she can be a proper citizen and contribute in the nation's development. By constructing 4.5 million toilets, Modi ji has given millions of daughters the right to live with dignity. This is what governments are meant for -- to give daughters the chance to become proper citizens and dream of a better future. The Modi government has done this.

Friends, GST has been passed. India has shown Pakistan and the world with surgical strikes that Popa bai's rule wont work here.

riends, by launching not just one, two, or five but 104 satellites simultaneously, Narendra bhai has put India in the forefront of space technology. Yoga is India's gift to the world, and by getting the UN to fix June 21 as Yoga Day, 170 countries now celebrate the event. This way Modi ji has taken Indian culture across the world. By giving Constitutional recognition to OBC commissions of inquiry, the rights of backward classes have been brought within the ambit of the Constitution. Other initiatives include lowering the tax exemption limit on political donations from Rs 20,000/ to Rs 2000/ as an anti-black money measure. Demonetisation, laws against benami property, enemy property, and PAN cards for 91 lakh new taxpayers has enhanced the level of transparency in the economy. The Bhim app has become the world's most popular digital payment mobile app.

Friends, a qualitative change is that a new work culture has been created. The administration has been sensitized to the needs of people. The Modi government has raised the bar on expectations from the government. Electricity for every village, toilets and gas cylinders in each home, and a bank account in every family. The Modi government has changed our scale of thinking. Friends, this can happen only when the party in power is run on principles. So allow me to reiterate that a party lacking in internal democracy and core principles, and which does not care for the people's welfare



is no good for the country.

Friends, go to any place in the world and see how India was seen three years ago and how it is seen today. There is a heaven and earth difference. This is the work of the Narendra Modi government, the BJP and its workers. The BJP is a well oiled machine in which any competent person can reach the top. Friends, the Modi government you elected completed three years on May 26. This government has come up with a plan every 15 days. I have a complete list of 106 plans. But worry not, I won't tell you about each one of them since I don't have the time.

Friends, at the core of each scheme lies the solutions to all the country's problems. I don't want to discuss them all, but knowing the bare names of each of these 106 plans is well worth it. Besides this is my job. So let me rattle them off. Stop me with claps if you are convinced of their authenticity: Pradhan Mantri Jandhana Yojna, Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, Sukanya Samriddhi, Mudra Bank Scheme, Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojna, Security Insurance Scheme, Atal Pension Scheme, Adarsh Gram Yojana, Crop Insurance Scheme, Village Irrigation Scheme, Make in India, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Digital India I have mentioned only 16. There are 106, and each is being strict monitored.

Friends, I am telling you all this because it is the job of each one of you to protect the country's democratic interests. Don't vote for mayor or MP seeing the outer dazzle of their persona. Earlier, whenever women used to buy even a 20 rupee earthenware pot they used to check its durability by knocking on it three or four times to see if it had any holes. Here you are handing over the job of running the country to a party. It's your responsibility to see what kind of party is it, and the competence of its leadership. Knock on each one to test their worth.

Friends, today my party had entrusted me with the job of introducing you to the BJP, brief you on its workings, principles, and the functioning of its governments. I have tried to do this in a short span of time.
